"Michelle" and me played theaters and jazz clubs up and down the Mississippi. Memphis, St. Louis, Little Rock, but our home was always New Orleans. The Orpheum was our favorite place to play. We would play to sold out crowds, and it didn't matter what time the show was. (Laughing) We packed this place out at 7PM and 1AM. This theater was the best place for me and "Michelle". You want to meet her?

On February 7th, 1921 the Orpheum Theatre opened its doors to New Orleans citizens wanting to be entertained. It was originally built as a vaudeville house with acts that included the soon to be famous Marx Brothers.
